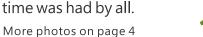
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### VC99s' Holiday Celebration

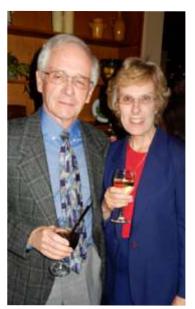
















December 10 – 13th Gary and I participated in the first San Luis Rio Colorado Balloon event in Mexico. San Luis is about 25 miles south of Yuma, Arizona just across the border into Mexico. Fifteen balloons were invited, three from California and the

rest from Arizona and other states. Maria, from Simi Valley, and I were the only women pilots. We were all welcomed Thursday night to a dinner with the President of the Sonora region. He personally shook our hands and provided us with gifts of dates, date liquor, and a city pin to wear.

We flew Friday, Saturday, and Sunday mornings, and did night glows on Friday and Saturday nights. Each morning we had to drive about 5 miles through town to the launch site. It

seemed that every25 ft there was a Stop Sign or Stop light. It would have taken much longer to get to the launch site but for the city police who escorted the caravan of 15 balloon trucks each morning with lights and sirens. We felt pretty special driving straight through the stop signs and lights. The city also provided us with wonderful local people to crew. They didn't speak much English

(none really), but that didn't seem to matter. They were just so happy and so very eager to help. The crew quickly bonded with the pilots and stayed with that balloon for the entire weekend. The winds were pretty brisk at sunrise both Friday and Saturday and

we were afraid we were not going to be able to pull off a flight. At 300ft AGL the wind was going about 40 mph. On the surface it barely calmed down enough to inflate the balloons. Most of the pilots hesitated to take off as the winds aloft were out of our comfort zone. Fast winds at 300ft can come down to the surface as the sun rises, and we certainly don't want to be landing the balloons at that speed. But what was comforting,

was knowing that the strong wind would take us out to the wide open desert where there is lots of space to do a high-wind landing if we had to. There was not going to be ANY landing in town with all the power lines crisscrossing like a spider web in every direction.

Friday morning I had a grandmother and teenage grandson as passengers. CONTINUED ON PAGE 6



They understood English pretty well and I really briefed the grandson hard on how to brace, and to help brace grandma, for a high-wind landing. As it turned out we just bounced a few times and I was

able to keep the balloon standing on the ground close to the outskirts of a very poor neighborhood. Soon the whole neighborhood was out and the kids had a blast jumping in and out of the basket.

Saturday morning I had a cute young couple as passengers. I was relieved that they were young and agile for another possible high-wind landing. Again the winds were fast at 500 ft AGL, and we got out to the desert in just 30 minutes. I had picked out my landing spot close to a dirt

road (for easy access for Gary to get to me in the chase truck) and was descending at about 300 ft per minute. At about 100 ft I advised the passengers to brace for landing. At that time the young man quietly got my attention and pulled out a box. He motioned he had a ring and wanted to propose to his girlfriend before we landed! Ugh! I leveled off quickly, and made up an excuse to the young lady that I changed my mind on that landing spot. I motioned to hurry up and get on with it! LOL. He actually got down on his knee. I managed to take pictures with one hand and fly with the other hand, keeping the balloon at about 20 ft above the ground for another mile, while he gave a seemingly looooong speech (in Spanish) and proposed. In the meantime we were getting further and further away from any roads! We had a pretty quick and rather sporty landing. There was no keeping the balloon up this time. We had a knock down-drag out landing at about 12 mph and the wind deflated the balloon quickly. Now we were out in middle of the desert with no civilization or roads anywhere in sight. But the city had thought of everything. They had engaged the off-road Sport Club with their dune-buggies, off-road trucks, and ATVs, to come to our rescue should any balloon land way out in the desert. Before the balloon was completely deflated a big off-road tuck was speeding right up to us.

Anticipating that we might land where it would take Gary time to get to me, I had packed up the envelope bag and hung it on the outside of the basket. So the two big guys in the truck and I packed up the balloon. We loaded the basket and envelope bag in the back of the off-road truck and we all piled in for a rather sporty drive back through the desert. Gary was waiting for us on the paved road where we moved the balloon to the trailer.

Sunday morning's flight was almost normal. I had three young women as passengers. The winds

were much slower and steerable. I didn't trust the winds and high-tailed it to the desert again and was able to nail that landing spot close to the road where Gary could get to me.

The President met us at the Hotel after the Sunday flight for a farewell breakfast on the patio. He had even gotten a flight in with Steve Wilkinson (I was wondering why three police cars were a part of Steve's chase crew!). He was so grateful for the efforts we made to fly and pull off a great first annual event. Now we were dreading the reported 2½ hour wait to cross the border to head back home. But the city came to our rescue again! The police again escorted the caravan of 15 balloon rigs past the miles of lined up cars and straight up to the border! We all got across in about 20 minutes.

What an adventure! The local crew was wonderful, the police were wonderful, the President was involved and pleased, and the city loved the balloons. It can't get much better than that. There are lots of pictures on my Facebook page if you are interested. We look forward to going to the event again next year in what the President said would become an annual event.
